

Exhibit preview: Jack Whitten gets first career-spanning retrospective

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Jack Whitten, an Alabama native who now resides in New York, is known for groundbreaking, large-scale, abstract expressionism-inspired paintings that tackle cultural, political and social issues as they have evolved throughout his five decades as a professional — and prolific — artist.

This spring, the Wexner Center for the Arts will present the first career-spanning retrospective of his work, featuring nearly 50 canvases that trace his stylistic evolution from the mid-1960s (during which he was deeply inspired by the Civil Rights movement and Vietnam) to his most recent mixed-media compositions.
